Chairman's Foreword

Dear Readers.

As I draft this the snow is slowly melting and hopefully will be merely a memory by the time our Spring Newsletter is published. Looking at the TV, I think that maybe Charvil got off relatively lightly.

The Parish Council continues to see changes in its line-up and since our last newsletter we have recently welcomed Daljit Ryatt to replace John Davies who moved away last winter. That now brings us up to our full complement of ten which will make things much easier, particularly in the committees. The best place to come and discuss any issues with your Parish Council is either in the 'Open Forum' at the start of every Parish Council meeting, or at the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) which this year is at 8:00pm on Wednesday 16th May in the Village Hall. As I mentioned in the last Newsletter, the APM is never as well attended as we would wish. We lay out free drinks and nibbles as an enticement, and perhaps more importantly, it is your opportunity to tell us what you think, what you would like us to concentrate on, and generally to have your input to proceedings.

Perhaps the most important item on the wider agenda right now is the prospect of considerably more housing being built, both in Charvil and its adjoining parishes. This is a subject which I have addressed in both my earlier Forewords, and the matter continues to take up much of the Council's time. Wokingham has a commitment (set by the government) to build some 850-879 houses each year between now and 2036; and there is no argument that we do need more housing if our friends and family are going to be able to live and work in the area.

Not every parish can take a NIMBY approach and essentially say "Yes we need more housing, but not here!". Hence we must accept that Charvil will need to take some more housing, as will the other surrounding parishes. The question then becomes 'where and of what type'? Given the current housing shortage, housing in Charvil is typically well out of the reach of most young couples, and offering so-called 'affordable housing' at 20% off £500k is not going to solve the problem. What we need is housing which will sell for around £200k-£250k, together with additional housing which is for rent and/ or part-purchase.

Wokingham Borough Council is currently working through a process of assessing over 200 potential building locations within the Borough (all for multiple-developments); however, if all the necessary infrastructure is to be provided, it is their view that at least two 'Strategic Locations' will need to be included. That means two areas where very significant building will be located, rather than spreading them throughout the Borough. One of those areas for consideration is in Ruscombe/Twyford where potentially 3000+ new houses could be built. This would involve the loss of Green Belt and prime agricultural land, and would put very significant pressure on the already stretched local infrastructure.

With the above in mind, and given the potential for such a plan to create chaos with the infrastructure (roads, schools, doctors, etc.) throughout the local area, Charvil Parish Council has chosen to support a campaign which has been set up by a number of local Borough and Parish Councillors to resist this 'strategic' location, while accepting that some level of further building is required in the area. Similarly, the campaign also promotes the identification and use of as many 'brown-field' sites as possible and the construction of truly 'affordable housing'. That campaign can be found at http://cprwok.co.uk and we urge all Charvil residents to view this website and sign-up to its petition. Without your active support we will have to accept what we are given, rather than what we need or want. I will be happy to discuss this in more detail at the APM.

To finish-off, we continue to invest in the facilities of the village, particularly the Pavilion and the Sports Pitches. We have started discussions on how we can encourage (and assist) Wokingham into helping us establish a new pre-school (although this will be a long-term project), and we would welcome your input as to what further facilities or projects you would like to see within the village. Come along and tell us at the APM!

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Edited Extracts from the Minutes of Parish Council Meetings

Meeting held on 20th November 2017

Open Forum - Borough Councillor John Halsall attended to discuss his Campaign to Protect Rural Wokingham. He ran through the background of the problems with the developers being slow to build once planning had been granted, resulting in the successful appeals, and how this is influencing the Borough's approach to the Local Plan. He feels that the Borough needs to take control of the developing itself because most local people can't afford the types of homes the commercial developers want to build, and that this development needs to be done close to urban centres with good transport links, possibly by redeveloping the centres of Twyford and Woodley, and some parts of Wokingham. Much of the development he envisages is flats, but some Charvil councillors felt that these are only suitable as rental properties. He ran through the Local Plan timetable; appealed for as many people as possible to write to Theresa May and WBC in planning terms; explained how much local support he has already for his campaign to prevent development of the greenbelt and grade one farmland; and how much money he will need to fight this campaign successfully. Council felt that the brownfield sites that Cllr. Halsall was referring to should be included in the sites being considered and asked why this had not vet been done and that while they would consider the request for funds, this would have to be considered carefully with all the other Budget issues.

Environment - Cllr. Andersen reported that she had four people interested in conducting a tree survey, and they will meet with the Veteran Tree Association in January

Meeting held on 18th December 2017

Donations - It was resolved to award payments of £242 to Sue Ryder, £300 to Twyford and District Volunteer Centre and £345 to Keep Mobile. It was also resolved to award a grant of £800 to Charvil and Sonning Junior Cricket Club. It was resolved not to award a grant to Me 2 as Council were still not satisfied that they needed a grant when holding large reserves. These decisions were passed unanimously.

To note the installation of the Speed Indicator Unit in Old Bath Road and the latest progress on Pipistrelle Way - The Speed indicator unit is now up and running, and it was suggested that the flashing angry face should be activated up to 50mph rather than the original setting of 45mph. Cllr Hobson was thanked for dealing with the data.

Environment – It was noted that TPO1611-2017, covering many trees on Beggars Hill Road near to Sandford Farm, has been implemented. Cllr Andersen is to meet with the Veteran Tree Association on 17th January to discuss how best to conduct the tree survey. Cllr Andersen expressed a view that she would like to try to boost recycling in the village, and the clerk is to arrange for her to meet with the Cleaner and Greener team to see what is possible.

To consider whether Charvil Parish wishes to contribute to the Northern Parish "Fighting Fund" – After some discussion of the issues, it was resolved not to contribute financially because it was too much to take from households without express permission. Council did, however, wish to support the campaign in other ways.

<u>To consider how to help the fete</u> – it was resolved to allow free use of East Park Farm and the Pavilion on 8th July, and it was reported that various councillors had agreed to help with the beer tent. Cllr Hobson reported that the new committee were very positive and looking forward to organising a very successful day.

Meeting held on 15th January 2018

In the light of the successful motion supporting the re-debate of the issue: To Consider whether Charvil Parish wishes to contribute £10 per household to the Northern Parish "Fighting Fund" — There was a long discussion about the benefits of supporting the Campaign for the Protection of Rural Wokingham, which are that Council should not leave it to the other parishes to fight the cause, our parish needs to be involved or it cannot complain against what it might get in terms of extra development, that many residents would expect the Council to be involved and that the Campaign is possibly the best way to influence the type of housing to be built as well as suitable supporting infrastructure. The contrary view included the arguments that Council does not have a mandate to take this money from each household, that in these straitened times, it is quite a lot to add to the precept and that legal costs could escalate and the Campaign will come back for more money. Once the discussion was complete, Council voted seven to one with one abstention to support the motion.

Environment It was resolved that the Parish Council would once again support the litter pick on Sunday 25th March at 2-4pm, starting from the Village Hall, which was approved unanimously.

Meeting held on Monday 19th February 2018

To hear an update from the Campaign to Protect Rural Wokingham - The Chairman had attended two meetings of the CPRW and had gathered there was some initial legal advice suggesting that the Greenbelt was easy to defend, but it would be harder to defend the Grade One agricultural land.

For this reason, each parish would need to consider where its "red lines" were and where they may countenance development within their boundaries. Cllr. Hobson asked that there should be regular updates on the CPRW, at least every time there is a meeting, and that there should be clear success criteria to measure progress by. It was agreed that the Chairman would draw up some ideas for this, and that other councillors would add their thoughts, with a view for these to be agreed at the next meeting. The Chairman asked all councillors to try to get people to sign the online petition, so that the target of 1500 signatures can be reached to force a debate at WBC.

To consider and if necessary, to approve, beginning the Neighbourhood Plan process, and to consider where Council would be prepared to accept extra housing in the village — It was resolved that Council would look to begin the process of developing a Neighbourhood Plan, and would investigate what grants are available. Council agreed that there is a need for more affordable homes in the area, and that they would be happier to accept housing in the rest of Hick's field, rather than north of the A4. They also felt that there needed to be more emphasis on infrastructure across the whole area if villages such as Charvil were to have more development. If Park Lane were to be developed further, there needed to be changes to it, and, there needed to be a crossing by the school.

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
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<u>Amenities Committee</u> – There was a discussion about the idea of having a family annual pass to the tennis courts and this was approved but its cost was to be referred back to the Amenities Committee as was the best way of securing the courts. It was noted that there was still no word on the pavilion floor, and that the assistant clerk would hopefully have some more news for the next Amenities meeting.

<u>Environment</u> Cllr. Andersen reported that she and Cllr. Hartley met with The Veteran Tree Association and that they have arranged a training session in April so that they can conduct the survey for Charvil. She also reported that she had met with Peter Baveystock, Irum Gulzar along with Cllr. Hartley and the clerk, to discuss recycling issues, and particularly the possibility of having a bottle bank in Charvil. Various sites were suggested and Cllrs. Andersen and Hartley were going to try to survey some residents for their views.

<u>To note the appointment of a Village Warden</u> – Michael Weldon has been appointed.

Council made comments on the following applications

173248 Application for the proposed expansion of the existing caravan site at The Homestead, Park Lane – the clerk was asked to comment as follows:

While the Parish Council is sympathetic to the housing needs of those living on the site, it is concerned about the change of use from commercial (B8) to residential accommodation (C3) in an area designated as countryside and outside the development limits.

If the Borough is minded to approve this application, Council would like a condition to be included that only allowed employees to live on the site.

- 173587 Application for the erection of one five-bedroom dwelling and detached garage with access and parking at Oaklands, Beggars Hill Road The clerk was asked to comment as follows:

 Charvil Parish Council would like to object to the above applications for the following reasons
 - 1. The proposed dwelling is outside the development limits as defined in the Managing Development Delivery document, and is therefore contrary to CP11 of the Core Strategy. The Borough's expressed desire in both documents is to prevent in-filling between settlements which would erode the character of the area, and this proposal would be a major step in the complete erosion of the gap between Woodley and Charvil which has already suffered serious harm with the allowed appeals on Waingels Road (Planning application reference 160902) and Park Lane (Planning application reference 143292). applicant makes much of the appeal allowed on Waingels Road. both in respect of the five-year housing supply, and the idea that CP11 is no longer a valid objection to development in the countryside. The lack of five-year housing supply has been a major weapon of developers recently, but Charvil Parish Council supports the Borough's assertion that the responsibility of any shortfall in this area lies with the developers themselves because the Borough has approved more than enough housing to fulfil its obligations to 2026. While this Council disagreed with the Inspectors' conclusions on both recent appeals, CP11 was outweighed rather than out-dated by other factors in both cases. and it feels that this site is very different in that it is opposite farmland (albeit with a temporary railway yard for the electrification of the line), and the road itself has the characteristics of a country lane rather than a main thoroughfare.
 - 2. Other applications for new dwellings on both Beggars Hill Road and Lands End Lane adjoining it, have been refused and upheld on appeal because the roads are unsuitable for any further development as they are both single carriage way with no pavement and minimal lighting, and the junction with Waingels Road is deemed dangerous. Council feels that nothing has changed in this regard, and the erection of a further five bedroomed dwelling is only likely to increase vehicle movements significantly in percentage terms on a road currently enjoyed by walkers, cyclists and horse riders, where there are no passing places beyond residents' driveways.

- Not only would the road become more dangerous for existing residents, but the amenity enjoyed presently would be adversely affected.
- 3. The supporting document for this application states that there would be a considerable CIL liability for this dwelling, which could wav toward dealing with the infrastructure improvements required in the area, but Council also notes that the applicant is applying for a "self-build" exemption, so the net effect would mean that the application is contrary to CP4. requiring improvement to the infrastructure.
- 4. Council's final concern is that this application is contrary to CP6, reducing the need to travel, and particularly by car. While schools and some recreational amenities are within walking distance of this site, the nearest bus stops are around a mile away with at least part of the journey on poorly lit roads and paths, and the nearest railway station is over two miles away, with no provision for safe cycling. Council does not regard this site as "sustainable" when considering travel to work and access to other amenities such as shops and doctors' surgeries.





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Application for submission of details to comply with the following condition of planning consent F/2014/2503 and Appeal Reference APP/X0360/W/15/3130829 (dated 02/03/2017) 9. Site Access - provision to accommodate all site operatives, visitors and construction vehicles loading, off-loading, parking and turning within the site during the construction period on land to the west of Park Lane – The clerk was asked to comment as follows:

Charvil Parish Council appreciates that the construction of the twenty-five dwellings will inevitably cause some disruption to the daily activities of those using Park Lane, and so would like to suggest some alterations to the current plan to alleviate some of residents' worst fears during this period.

- 1. Could the new site entrance be moved to the very bottom of the field, adjacent to the Homestead boundary? This would reduce the dangers of the site entrance being directly opposite the car park exit, which is used extensively throughout the day, but particularly at school drop-off and pick-up time. It also has the potential to being much wider than the proposed entrance opposite the car park exit, which will hopefully allow larger construction vehicles to access the site easily. At present, the proposed site entrance is not wide enough for these vehicles to access the field without driving on the verge on the car park side of the road, and even then, some have not been able to enter the field. The entrance must be wide enough to allow the largest of vehicles to access the site without blocking the road.
- 2. Park Lane only has a pavement on the side of the road adjacent to the site, so there is an inevitable hazard for children walking to school. The primary school parents are very concerned about their children's safety during this phase and would appreciate the re-siting of the entrance to as far from the school as possible which would be nearest The Homestead.
- 3. Council would appreciate some conditions being imposed to reduce the likelihood of accidents during this period. One would be that construction vehicles cannot access the site at the peak times of school drop off (8.30-9.15am) or pick-up (3-3.30pm). We feel this would reduce both congestion and danger. Additionally, Council would like strict parking controls on Park Lane so that none can park on Park Lane itself. This should not be a problem if the site compound is large enough.

- 180224 Application for the proposed erection of 3 four-bed detached dwellings with on-site parking and access off Park View Drive South on land to the rear of 35-37 Park View Drive South The clerk was asked to comment as follows:
 - Charvil Parish Council would like to object to the above applications for the following reasons
 - This proposal is to develop the back gardens of 35 and 37 Park View Drive South, which is contrary to the Borough's policy TB09 as laid out in the MDD DPD. Council is not convinced that this development would enhance the local area, as would have to be the case for it to be allowed.
 - Council feels that this would be over development of the site, particularly as the surrounding area has a spacious feel, and is at present, an important green lung in the area, separating the mixed development on Park View Drive from the more uniform development of Strathmore Drive.
 - 3. Council is concerned that this development would put pressure on the trees that are proposed to be left according to the Arboricultural Report conducted by the developer. The garden of the house to the rear of Nos 45 to 47 will be surrounded by tall leylandii to the east and a mixture of mature trees to the north and west. Council is concerned that this would encourage any future householder to want to remove what trees they can get away with. Similarly, the proposed dwelling closest to Strathmore Drive to the rear of No.35, will have overhanging trees to the west, and while the initial plan is to cut back this tree on one side, Council still feel this may be in some danger as well.
 - 4. Council is concerned that there is already a number of conflicting uses of the narrow Park View Drive South; it is the main route to secondary school for most Charvil children; it is a major rat run as commuters find it easier to access the A4 from there than from the poorly designed roundabout at the Wee Waif; it often has multiple parked vehicles on it, particularly at the northern end where there is a popular shop; and finally it is a residential road with large houses, meaning that increasingly, cars are parked on the road because of more adults in households than used to be the case. Another three dwellings will mean at least another six cars trying to get out each day and will reduce the space for onroad parking where there is greatest demand for it.

Borough Councillor's Report

Dear Resident

Half way through March and it feels like November! Spring will be here soon, we just need to be positive.

Jubilee Hall / St. Patrick's

I have received a number of emails and seen some of the Facebook messages of which I note some have been removed. From the beginning when the hall was closed and the pre-school departed, it was anticipated that this would become housing due to the fact it is a Brown Field Site. I am aware that it is disappointing to a number of residents that this has taken place, however, I have put an idea with the PCC.

The PCC build homes for local Charvil residents who are on wages that saving and trying to find the deposit are proving difficult. The homes are built at a reasonable cost and homes are sold only to Charvil residents who match the criteria to first time buyers. The land is leased to the new owners in the same way flats are sold where in 99% of cases there is ground leasing.

Currently, I have not received a response from the Church or PCC.

I know there are plans for the building of one house be built, alas, I fear that one house won't be the final application. The land is a classic Brown Field Site, with an existing building which will be harder to put pass planning departments and list.

Hicks Development

The entrance opposite the school, is proving to be dangerous. I have spoken to the Planning Department and they were the ones who instructed Hicks, this was to be the temporary access for various ecological searches to take place. I am trying to get the access moved further down Park Lane so that access to the school is not hindered.

General Development within the Northern WBC area

The relevant meetings and a petition have taken place. A petition will be presented to the Council 22nd March.

Fly Tipping

It is definitely on the increase. All fly tipping reported to me I have passed on to Wokingham Borough Council. After going for a walk today (Sunday) 18th I noted further fly tipping and have reported this.

Bottle Banks

It has been requested that Charvil has a bottle bank area. This is proving controversial with residents as a number of areas pin pointed are either too narrow, too close to houses etc. We have very limited areas to place a bottle bank and the best I have come up with is the very far end of the Car Parking EPF, right over towards the Railway track. If you have any ideas where this could be placed without causing issues, please can you let me or the Parish Council know of suggested places.

Speed Display Camera

I hope many of you will have seen the Speed Display Camera which the Parish Council has recently installed on the Old Bath Road. The background to installing the camera was a long standing concern about the speed of some vehicles using the road. Residents have expressed concern about the safety of the Zebra Crossing and there was a feeling that some drivers were travelling too fast and some were failing to stop when people were waiting to cross.

The Parish Council has, over time, been in dialogue with Wokingham Borough Council and the Police as to what could be done to improve matters. Both have been helpful but our view was that we needed both better information on actual speed and a means of giving feedback directly to drivers in the hope that a visual representation of their speed would encourage them to slow down.

As you can see the camera shows the speed that a driver is travelling and it also collects data which can be analysed by the software that comes with the camera. This is useful in making our case to Wokingham and the Police for further action on their part.

I thought you would be interested to hear about some of the data we have collected. For example, in the period 15th December to 18th January there were 110201 records. The average speed was 29.2 mph and 85% of the vehicles were driving slower or up to 36 mph. There were, however, 522 vehicles travelling at 50 mph or more and the highest speed recorded was 79 mph. This was at the start of the speed detection zone but its speed was still 65 mph when leaving the detection zone.

More recently, in the period 17/03/2018 to 25/03/2018 there were 27551 records. The average speed was 29.3 mph and 85% of vehicles were travelling at 36 mph or less. So much the same as in the December to January period. The maximum speed recorded was 66 mph. This was at 18:16, a time when the roads and pavements will be very busy.

In terms of the success of the camera. Clearly we don't know what speeds were like before it was installed. It does show us that average speeds are within the speed limit but it also shows a worrying number of very high speed vehicles using the road.

Anecdotally, when I am downloading the data or just walking past, I have seen many cars slowing down so I hope it is having an effect. We will continue to discuss with Wokingham Borough Council and the Police how they can help to lower speeds on this road and the data will be of great use in showing the actual speed of vehicles.

The camera can be moved so periodically we will move it to other locations in the Parish, to give us a picture of speeds elsewhere.

Twyford Neighbourhood Policing Team Update

Spring has arrived and the days are getting lighter and longer so we thought it useful to pass on some crime prevention advice about securing your windows and doors.

French Doors:

If you have French doors or a conservatory that has double doors, you can buy a 'Patlock' which locks the two door handles in position. It provides a visual deterrent to any would be intruders and instant peace of mind for home owners. The lock works by holding the internal door handles secure so that the external handles cannot be operated. This ensures that the door mechanism remains in the locked position, even if the locks are snapped or removed. These can be purchased from a variety of online retailers.

Remember to shut and lock all doors and windows even when you are in the garden.



Reading & District Cigarette Card & Postcard Club

January 11th saw member Ken Townsend recount with pictures the early history of recording on disc and wax recordings, working as a sound engineer for EMI. For his last twenty years working for EMI he was Studio Manager at the illustrious Abbey Road Studios. Ken worked for EMI making sound recordings of famous singing artists and orchestras in European and UK cities. Famous vocalist artists and groups who visited Abbey Road including Shirley Bassey, Cilla Black, Alma Cogan, as well as Pink Floyd, The Hollies, The Wurzels, The Shadows, and the Beatles dating back to their first Artist Test on 6th June 1962, following rejection by other recording studios. Short musical excerpts of various artists, conductors and orchestras relating to Ken's work were played including George Formby, Gracie Fields and many other familiar 'oldies'. A fascinating nostalgic trip down memory lane of the 1960's – 80s, thoroughly enjoyed by everyone.

February 8th at Charvil revealed 'The Secrets of the Box', a talk by guest speaker, Tony Weston, who used a power point presentation to tell the members about an old Victorian writing box purchased at a country sale by his grandmother in 1920. In need of quality restoration, this was carried out by a Caversham craftsman who was briefed to open the known 'secret' compartment. Pictures showed the 'before and after' results, and the secret of the hidden compartment and it's contents. This was found to contain a vast quantity of invoices and bills, mainly from the 1870's, which enabled Tony to use his family history experience to explore the Scales family going back to the 1750's, covering the family history of the male and female branches. The paperwork stemmed from the Newark area, near Collingham. The family ran a successful quality linen mill business which prospered during the nineteenth century, employing at least 20 workers who were mainly housed accommodation built on the mill site, some of the invoices were for bulk provisions, e.g. bacon. Unfortunately, cheaper linen foreign imports during the 1890's meant that the mill became unviable and it closed circa Today, houses have been built on the site, but it was an enthralling talk which everyone thoroughly enjoyed.

Tony discovered a Scales family survivor in Wiltshire who added to the family history information, and Tony handed over some of the originals to him after taking copies, other material has gone to the local museum who assisted Tony in his researches.

The evening concluded with the traditional single card competition, raffle and refreshments.

April 12th sees one of the Club's popular Quarterly Auctions, and a number of cigarette card and postcard items have been handed in by local residents for sale. The Club always welcomes items from members of the public, for details ring 0118-9695155.




headed to New York to take in the sights, although the schedule didn't quite allow for a Piggott School reunion with the other trip. Maybe next time...
