

Chairman's Foreword

Dear Residents

I'm writing this Foreword in the sweltering heat of the UK's hottest summer for as long as most of us can remember; my lawn is yellow (what lawn!), as I suspect is everyone else's, along with the Council's playing fields at EPF. Maybe this will be some long-forgotten memory by the time that this Newsletter is published!

Last weekend a goodly number of us attended the annual Charvil Village Fete on the EPF fields. Let me take this opportunity to say a heart-felt 'thank you' and 'congratulations' to the new Fete Committee who did a truly excellent job this time. We had a considerable number of new ideas and new events at the fete, which really gave it a 'community' feel. To those Charvil residents who were not able to attend, I strongly suggest that you put it into your diary for 2019 right now!

Avid readers of our Newsletter will know that in my last Foreword I gave a quick summary of some of the changes in our Parish Council line-up. At that point we were up to our full complement of ten councillors, albeit that a number were relatively new faces. As a result we have made some changes to the various committee structures and members, such that the 'new faces' are supported on all committees by the more experienced councillors. We have also created an additional committee specifically to address 'Planning/ Environment/Highways' as we felt that these issues were not receiving the level of councillor scrutiny which they required.

While I am on this subject, I have to acknowledge the resignation of two councillors; John Hobson and Fiona Mowlem. John is moving out of the area and Fiona has increased family commitments which would make it impossible for her to provide the level of involvement which she believes is required. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Fiona and John for the very significant contributions which they have made to Charvil Parish Council over the past few years; we will miss their experienced and energetic input to council debates, and also to the various projects which they both took responsibility for outside 'normal' council time.

Having said that, it becomes clear that the council will soon be advertising for residents to put themselves forward for co-option into the above two vacancies.

As I have said before, and most recently in our Winter Newsletter, if you have a skill to offer, an interest in working to improve the village, and some element of spare time (particularly on alternate Monday evenings), then we would like to hear from you; please pass your name (and ideally a short CV) on to the Parish Clerk at clerk@charvil.com. In addition, every council meeting has an 'Open Forum' at the start where any resident can ask questions or make any point which they feel the council should hear. Residents are also free to sit through any council meeting as an observer if you feel that you would like to better understand what we do before putting your name forward.

In my last Foreword I laid-out in some detail the upcoming (and significant) 'Planning' issues which we are likely to see over the coming few years. I have to admit to being a little surprised at the absence of any feedback on this, given its inevitable impact on the village. I will do my best to include any further updates in my future Forewords.

In conclusion, the council continues to invest in the facilities of the village, particularly in the Pavilion and the Sports facilities at EPF which we took-over from Wokingham two years ago. In addition, we continue to seek ways in which we can work with Wokingham Borough Council to help us establish a new pre-school in the village, although (as I have said before) this will be a long-term project. Again, we would welcome any input from residents as to what further facilities or projects you would like us to work on to improve our village.

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Edited Extracts from the Minutes of Parish Council Meetings Meeting held on 19th March 2018

ENVIRONMENT - To hear an update on the idea of introducing bottle banks to Charvil - Cllrs. Andersen and Hartley said there was a need for more consultation, but so far, the general feeling was that yes, there should be recycling facilities in Charvil, and that they should be at the Village Hall. This site has already been ruled out due to the proximity of houses and given the negative feedback on facilities being located in Milestone Avenue, it was resolved that Council would recommend East Park Farm, subject to more consultation with local residents.

To hear an update from the Local Planning Update meeting attended by the Chairman on 10th March — The Chairman explained the background of the meeting; that it was arranged by David Locke Associates, who have been tasked with looking into the three large sites that have been put forward in the Local Plan Call for Sites. There is much local opposition to building in the Greenbelt, but WBC need to show they have investigated all sites, otherwise they could fall foul of the law when it comes to the final Planning Inspection of the Local Plan. There was also some discussion about where development might be considered acceptable in the Northern Parishes, and what infra-structure changes needed to be made — possibly a Twyford by-pass to mitigate the pollution at Twyford Crossroads, for example.

Meeting held on 23rd April 2018

<u>HIGHWAYS</u> - <u>To hear any news on Pipistrelle Way</u> – Cllr. Mowlem reported that Borough Cllr. Baker said he would chase up the issue, but it may be that, because the developer had opted not to pay the extra to have the road adopted when the road was built, the Borough would not think it fair to adopt now.

<u>To hear an update on the Park Lane roundabout</u> – The Village Society are adopting the roundabout and have started planting fresh shrubs. Residents are already commenting on how much better it is looking.

The Chairman reported that he had been in communication with the Highways Department regarding the potholes in Waingels Road and under the railway bridge in Park Lane and is waiting for further action.

ENVIRONMENT - To hear an update on the idea of introducing bottle banks to Charvil — Council and residents both felt that East Park Farm was the best location, but both the WBC contractor and the headmaster of Piggott had objected. It was suggested that Council should put one at both East Park Farm and Milestone Avenue for a trial period of three months. Clerk's note: WBC have confirmed that their contractors will not put bottle banks at the East Park Farm car park.

To inform Council of the Stream Pollution and possible further action – It was reported that the Borough Councillor had met with Thames Water and had checked the water coming from the Homestead, which was clean. The Thames Water representative felt that there may be something under the bridge causing the contamination that had been observed. Councillors who had seen the pollution felt that a check needed to be conducted in the morning because this was when oil and a strong fuel smell were most evident. It was agreed that samples would be taken from the stream and given to the Borough Councillor who would follow it up.

To hear any news from the CPRW and any local plan developments — The petition to discuss this issue at WBC has been reached, and it has been proposed that this debate should take place in Loddon Hall. The possible issues with the proximity of Aldermaston the Grazeley sites have been resolved and the site has been shortlisted by the Government for possible extra Garden Village funding. The final decision will be taken in the autumn. The public consultation on the Local Plan will take place in May/June. Borough Cllr Hallsall is to come to the Annual Parish Meeting.

Meeting held on 21st May 2018

To consider any matters arising from the Annual Parish Meeting and note anything that will need to be added to a future agenda arising from this — Some residents reported that they thought the Network Rail compound on Waingels Road would need to be there beyond August and wondered whether Network Rail may add pressure on WBC to have the road constriction removed. Another resident felt there were too many signs on the Park Lane roundabout.

Another asked whether the SID could be moved to the A4 and finally, a resident complained that he had not had a reply from the Council regarding the trees on The Hawthorns. *Clerk's note: the clerk never received such an e-mail.*

To consider the reply to the Chairman regarding potholes The Chairman had complained to Wokingham, and after some time, had a reply from Gareth Wisemen apologising for the poor quality of repairs, and that to do them properly, the bridge on Park Lane will need to be closed, and there will have to be traffic lights on Waingels Road, both of which will take some time to organise. Clerk's note: emergency repairs have been made to the worst holes.

<u>To hear any more information on the Stream Pollution</u> – Cllr. Keward reported that the Environment Agency has cleaned out the stream under the bridge, and that he has not seen any pollution for the last three weeks. He will continue to monitor.

Amenities Committee – The minutes of a meeting on 14th May were noted. The issue of whether to allow Freckles Pre-school the opportunity to ask OFSTED to approve the pavilion as a suitable location for a pre-school was discussed. It was accepted that the logical conclusion of approval would be the acceptance that we would have to give notice on our very few daytime users. It was agreed that Council would allow Freckles to go ahead providing they accepted we would have to give existing users a three-month notice period, that they would have to be packed away, that evening lets start at 4.30 and they would have to work with that, that there are storage issues to be resolved and that Council would try to arrange an outdoor space for exclusive pre-school use.

Meeting held on Monday 18th June 2018

HIGHWAYS

There have been no further developments regarding Pipistrelle Way. The hedges on Park Lane need cutting back and the Borough Councillor has asked for this to be done. It was agreed to leave the Speed Indicator Device in the same place for now. Clerk's note: the hedges on Park Lane have now been cut back.

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To hear a report back from a meeting with Brenda Cowdery regarding Jubilee Hall and to decide if Council wishes to support her — The Chairman gave a brief report on the history of the Hall and of the meeting he had with Brenda the previous week. Various ideas were discussed but in the end it was felt that the Parish Council would be better working on improving relations with the Church going forwards, as the most recent letter from the Vicar was unequivocal that he regarded this as the end of the matter and legally it would appear that the Church is within its rights to sell the land and for the proceeds to be spent on Church matters within the Parishes of Sonning and Charvil.

180571 Application for the proposed erection of single storey side and rear extension following the demolition of existing conservatory plus conversion of existing garage to create habitable accommodation at 8 St Patrick's Avenue

- 180609 Application for proposed erection of a replacement dwelling with integrated garage following demolition of existing bungalow, store and detached garage at Thatcher's Mead, Thames Drive
- 180821 Application for the proposed erection of single storey rear extension following demolition of existing conservatory at 40, East Park Farm Drive
- 180829 Application for the proposed erection of a single storey front and rear extension at 15a Charvil House Road
- 181069 Application for the proposed erection of a single storey rear extension at 19 Cheviot Drive
- 181553 Application for the proposed partial erection of single storey side extension with pitched roof following demolition of existing flat roof side extension at 34 Chiltern Drive

Council made comments on the following applications

180174 Application for the proposed erection of single storey side/ front extension to form porch and first floor side extension to Old Bath House, 2 Strathmore Drive – The clerk was asked to comment as follows:

Two previous applications have been made and refused for very similar extensions to this dwelling, and Council does not see any reason why this plan should now be acceptable. The main concern is that the building line will be breached and that this will set an unwanted precedent for future developments

180471 Application for variation to Conditions 10 and 11 of planning permission 173248 modifying the requirement that caravan residents be workers of 'A Better Service' and variation to Condition 14 to remedy errors in the maximum dimensions of the caravans at The Homestead, Park Lane – The clerk was asked to comment as follows:

Condition 10: Council accepts the proposal to include people who last worked on the site but feel that "adjacent businesses" could be open to interpretation, so would rather the wording be for businesses on the Homestead site.

- 180716 Application for the proposed erection of a three-bed detached dwelling at 111 Old Bath Road The clerk was asked to object as follows:
 - 1. According to the MDD DPD and Borough Design Guide, any new development on gardens needs to make a positive contribution to the built area as stated in the MDD TB06. Council feels that this proposal fails to add anything positive because it will appear cramped between one house built to add a spacious feel to the street scene, and two historic cottages set in a verdant environment. While it is an improvement on the previous design put forward in 2016, Council feels this development would still have a negative impact on the area.
 - 2. Given that permission has been given to build on the garden the other side of 111, Old Bath Road, to allow another dwelling on the site of the garage would clearly be over-development. This is made worse by the loss of all front garden space to parking, which will not be compensated for by new hedge planting contrary to CC03.
 - 3. Council feel that the plan is completely out of character with the development heading east on the Old Bath Road, where the majority of homes have attractive front gardens, or at least some green areas as one would expect in a village. This development will create an urban feel to this area which is clearly of character when seen in the context of the rest of this part of the village contrary to CC02.
 - 4. Council is concerned by the amount of misinformation included in the application form. The garage was demolished soon after the recent sale of the site, and all natural features have been removed from the site. There is also a question mark over the parking spaces. There are two spaces allocated to this dwelling in the plan, not four as stated in the application. Lastly, this will be increasing the numbers of dwellings by one, which is also not stated in the application.


- 180787 Application for the proposed temporary use of a mobile home on site for 12-month period at 111 Old Bath Road The clerk was asked to object as follows:
 - 1. This site has been cleared without permission and should still be classified as a back garden. Given this is the case, siting a caravan, albeit on a temporary basis, is contrary to existing planning regulations.
 - 2. To enable a mobile home to be placed on this site, hardcore has been placed over the complete site, so that it is completely out of keeping with the surrounding area. To compound this, the level of the site is significantly higher than the neighbouring properties, and so has a negative impact on the gardens of 117 and 119 Old Bath Road in terms of loss of privacy and run off from the site in wet weather.
- 181175 Application for the proposed conversion of existing residential unit to four self-contained flats with associated parking and amenity at 36 Park View Drive South the clerk was asked to comment as follows:

As with the previous application, Charvil Parish Council has no concerns with the flats themselves, but because of the nature of the site, on the junction of the A4/Park View Drive South and sharing the site with a thriving shop, Council remains concerned about parking. Council is concerned where the staff running the shop will park their vehicles, as it is important to road safety that the existing customer spaces are used for their present purpose, not for staff or residents.

Council also remains concerned that there are no unallocated parking spaces.

180787 Application for the proposed temporary use of a mobile home on site for 12-month period at 111 Old Bath Road (revised plan) – The clerk was asked to object as follows:

The revised plan is for a bigger mobile home which makes the original transgression worse.

What a lovely summer, I do hope you all took the opportunity during the warm days to get out and about around Charvil, Dinton Pastures and the River Thames.

Over the months, I have had very little to deal with and what I have dealt with has been with residents directly.

Fly Tipping: It is definitely on the increase, please let me know about areas that have incurred fly tipping.

Hicks Site: due to the location of access I am working with the officer to have this moved as it is too dangerous being in front of the exit route for the School. I have spoken to John Hicks and requested that some sense is prevailed as Hicks are waiting for the kerb to be dropped.

This new site gives me more ammunition to have a pelican crossing installed for the school.

Hedges: I do ask that you keep your hedges cut back, especially when they are next to a public footpath.

Bonfires: I noted a number of bonfires taking place, please take great care as a little rain is not enough to have dampened down hedges, fences etc.

Dog Fouling: If you see a business or individual not clearing up, please take a photo and send on to me or WBC and we will deal with the matter to the best of our ability.

Foster Caring: WBC have a shortfall of Foster Carers. If you would be interested in fostering please contact WBC or give me a call and I can direct you to the right people to talk too.

Request for feedback from Wokingham Borough Council

The Overview and Scrutiny Management Committee is undertaking a review of the Council's grass cutting service.

The new service started in April 2016 and aimed to provide a more flexible service which responded to local needs and priorities. However, there have been a number of complaints about the quality and effectiveness of the service which has led to the review.

The Committee would like to hear the views of residents, Town and Parish Councils and Community Groups about the frequency and quality of grass cutting across the Borough. This could include the timeliness and frequency of cuts, the quality of the work, disposal of grass cuttings, impact of wildflower areas, information on the Council's website, complaints handling or any other issues.

The Committee will be holding witness sessions in the autumn, but, in the first instance it would like to receive written evidence or comments.

Twyford Neighbourhood Policing Team Update from PCSO Mike Soones

Summer is now in full swing and with it brings temperatures of up to 33°! Whilst you have been working hard, at school or going on holiday and topping up your tans, the Twyford NHPT has been hard at work tackling



issues within the community from anti-social behaviour to local thefts & robberies. We are delighted to report that anti-social behaviour in the local area has decreased and we are receiving fewer calls regarding this; however, we still urge residents to report any suspicious activity to the Neighbourhood Team. If you believe there is a crime in progress, please call 999; otherwise please report your concerns on our website www.thamesvalley.police.uk or by calling 101.

To prevent thieves spoiling your summer, please follow these simple steps:

- Ensure all windows and doors are closed and locked when you are out.
- If you want to leave windows open while you sleep, fit window restrictors so they cannot be fully opened, or be sure that they are not large enough to allow access to a burglar.
- When out in your back garden ensure that windows and doors to the front of the house are secure. It only takes a second for someone to get into your home and take things without you noticing.
- Do not leave valuables on display in front of windows or in reach of open windows or doors.
- Ensure that all barbecue and garden equipment and tools are securely locked up in a shed and out of sight. Tools and ladders can be used by a potential offender to break in to your home.
- Consider fitting outside security lighting, a visible alarm or CCTV cameras to deter burglars. Even using pea shingle or gravel on a driveway and spiky plants in flowerbeds can help.
- Don't leave any keys near entry points where they can be 'fished' or 'hooked' out through the window, letter box or cat flap.

Theft from Motor Vehicles

We have seen a rise in thefts from motor vehicles in recent weeks, most commonly with vans. We urge residents to report any suspicious activity to the Neighbourhood Team and to safeguard their own vehicles by following the below advice:

- Never leave your keys in the ignition while your vehicle is unattended.
- A lways take precautions and lock your car.
- Make sure windows are closed, even if you're away from your vehicle for just a few minutes.
- Make sure nothing is left on display in your car.
- Never think leaving items in the boot or the back of a van is safe, who is to say someone didn't see you leave them there?
- If you do own a van, be aware that these are very easy to break into so ensure to add additional security, especially if you have high-value tools in the back.
- Try to park vans against a wall or garage door so that the back doors can't be opened.

Parking

We have had numerous complaints regarding commuter parking in many of the residential roads in the vicinity of Twyford Train Station. Wokingham Borough Council are now responsible for the parking issues and thus will be issuing the tickets. Thames Valley Police only issue tickets for obstructions. Also be aware that if there are no parking restrictions in the area of the vehicle, then we do not have any powers to deal with them and it will have to be dealt with via the local You council. can report parking issues to them www.wokingham.gov.uk

In regards to school parking, we are aware that at times parking around schools can be dangerous and implore people to park with courtesy and thought. We do cover a large area which includes 10 schools so cannot always have an eye on the situation, which is why the support of the local community is invaluable.

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Physio Matters... "**Growing Pains?**" By Elizabeth Jones MCSP HCPC MMACP Clinical Lead Physiotherapist at Physiocare

Earlier this year Physiocare was asked if they could offer any support to a local girls football club. With there being something about gender equality in the news almost every week, how could we say no? On meeting with the coaches I was amazed to learn that Wargrave Girls Football Club currently have 300 hundred girls playing football every week and it was of no surprise to me to learn that the majority of them have their knees strapped every time they play.

We see lots of sporty youngsters in clinic with pain at the front of their knee that their parents often put down to growing pains. Things are not usually bad enough to stop most of them playing but more worryingly for both parents and the youngster involved the symptoms can be quite persistent.

Growing pains are aches and cramp like pains in the lower legs that usually develop during the evening or at night but not present in the morning. It most commonly occurs in children between the age of 3 and 12 and usually following a more active day.

Some doctors prefer to use the term 'recurrent nocturnal limb pain in children'. This is quite different from the anterior knee pain, which is commonly seen, in adolescent sporty children.

There has been an increase in knee injuries amongst sports men and women and researchers suspect that the increase in knee injuries seen may be due to the growing number of females participating in competitive sports.



Girls are built differently from boys, and these differences may impact their mechanics. Female hips grow wider after puberty, which sometimes results in a greater Q angle, the angle between the hip and the knee. In addition girls move differently to boys and this fact may also contribute to their increased predisposition to knee injury and knee pain. Girls tend to run more upright, and land with their knees buckled

inwards which places a greater strain on the knee.

Most commonly this is about muscle strength whereby the muscles are not strong enough to withstand the demands of a sporty youngster, so putting strain on the local soft tissues around a joint. In addition they tend to exhibit inadequate neuromuscular control. This is the unconscious response of a muscle to the stabilize a joint.

The good news is that unlike anatomical differences these neuromuscular risk factors can be modified through training. We recommend exercises that focus on building strength in the leg and core muscles and improving balance, jumping and landing techniques. As the muscle strength and joint control improves so the sight of lots of young girls wearing knee strapping will diminish.

More than ever we are aware of maintaining a healthy lifestyle throughout our lives and whatever the age pain is always a deterrent to exercising. Not all of us are naturally designed to exercise painfree but with a bit of targeted rehab training most of can improve our tolerance to most types of exercise. Increasingly I see my role as not just treating injuries but helping in their prevention. Hopefully my input and advice to the coaches at Wargrave Girls Football Club has helped increase their understanding of knee pain in girls and maybe resulted in some modification to the choice of exercises in the warm up and coaching sessions for the girls. Just maybe we might see fewer girls with strapped up knees during the coming season.

Charvil Community Tennis Club

CCTC, a local community tennis club launched on the back of the London Olympics has had its fifth birthday. Charvil Community Tennis Club, based on East Park Farm, has been serving up coaching and sporting facilities for the last five years as part of the Olympic legacy to encourage more people to take up sport.

The non-for profit organisation, which was formed by tennis loving residents with the support of Wokingham Borough Council, now provides regular coaching on the two tennis courts and has seen its membership grow. The club has been registered with **the Lawn Tennis Association (LTA)** from the beginning.

Regular coaching is available on Tuesdays and Sundays in the autumn and spring terms for both juniors and adults. In addition, there are club nights, focused Tuesday afternoon/evening sessions and Saturday midday doubles aimed at specific skill building techniques.

With the milder winters we very much see tennis as an all-year round sociable game. We are a friendly and welcoming club for people of all ages and all abilities.

As a community organisation the committees aim is to continue that Olympic legacy of inspiring people of all ages to take up sport.





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Physio Matters... "A Good Night's Sleep" By Elizabeth Jones MCSP HCPC MMACP Clinical Lead Physiotherapist at Physiocare

I cannot tell you how many times a client has come to seem with back or neck pain saying 'I think I need a new mattress". Their reasoning is I suspect, down to the fact that their aches and pains are worse in the morning! Its guite usual for back or neck pain to feel a little worse in the morning, but as you get up and get going clients often report some improvement in their symptoms, not surprizing given that gentle



exercise is good for most soft tissue and joint problems.

As we get older the rest afforded by a good night's sleep often results in a sense of stiffness when we get up on the morning. It takes a few steps for our muscles and joints to get working properly.

Weak muscles and tight tendons tend to stiffen during sleep and it's no different when we have been sat in a car for a long journey, the first few steps can be quite awkward. As our joints get older, the spongy cushioning of the cartilage that lines our joints begins to dry out and stiffen and the joint is less lubricated with synovial fluid. Osteoarthritis, (the "wear and tear" kind), and rheumatoid arthritis, (which involves swelling and inflammation), can both trigger morning stiffness.

Researchers have also discovered another reason why our limbs can feel rigid and achy when we rise. The body's biological clock suppresses anti-inflammatory proteins during sleep. When we start moving around each morning our body is playing catch up as the effects of the proteins wear off. In effect our body's own 'ibuprofen' has not kicked in yet.

That said a poor unsupportive mattress could definitely aggravate things further. I'm somewhat unsure what an orthopaedic mattress actually is! I suspect it's a marketing term suggesting that a firm or supportive mattress is good for your back. A common misconception is that we all need a firm mattress, (probably originated from putting a board under your bed when you have a bad back.) There is a difference between supportive, which is definitely a must and a firm or hard mattress, which may not always be the most suitable.

A pocket-sprung mattress, whereby each coil is contained within its own pocket so is able (unlike an open coiled mattress) to move independently and so offer varying degrees of support as necessary. This ensures that the natural alignment of the spine is not compromised. The body weight is evenly distributed so that the relevant body portions are accorded the right support with a special emphasis on the spine, lower lumbar, pelvic and hip regions. The choice of mattress base will also affect the sense of firmness, choosing a wooden slatted base will somewhat increases this whereas a sprung divan base will add to the feeling of luxury. Though more expensive than the open coiled mattress, given the length of time we spend in bed, I rather feel the extra cost is worth the investment.

How firm your mattress should be will depend upon how heavy you are. The lighter we are the softer the mattress we require. A general guideline is 'soft' for those under eleven stone, medium for those weighing eleven to fifteen stone and firm or extra firm for those heavier individuals. Most manufacturers of pocket sprung mattresses offer dual firms mattress so allowing the option of having a mattress suitable for partners of different stature.

An alternative mattress, which has become more popular in recent times, is the memory foam. Memory foam is heat sensitive and highly responsive. This allows it to mould to your body so helping to reduce pressure points. Although appreciating the supportive nature of the memory foam a possible downside is that they can be warm to sleep on.

Bear in mind that while many retailers adopt a firmness rating scale of their own there is no universally agreed way to score the firmness of a mattress. The same is true for mattress of 'ortho' or 'osteo' in their names again there is no agreed standard for the use of these terms, so while they can be a useful guide you will not know what suits you until you have lain on it for yourself.
