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#### Minutes of the Meeting of the Planning, Environment and Highways Committee held on <u>13th May 2019</u>

## Absent

58/19 **OPEN FORUM** – Andrew Peacock and Dagmar Weatherall of Thames Water attended to explain the latest position with the installation of a sewer in Waingels Road. Waingels Road is to be closed for four days at the end of May while trial trenches are dug at various points with a view to installing a sewer for the Norris Green homes in the summer. The rest of the project is trickier because they need to find a suitable site for a pumping station and the best, and possibly only suitable site, is on land belonging to Waingels College. There is a meeting shortly to decide the best approach, and there will be renewed attempts to achieve a positive outcome to negotiations with Waingels College. If the worst came to the worst, Thames Water can go down the route of Compulsory Purchase Orders, but this is very much a last resort as it creates a long time lag or a project that has already been dogged by delays. The timescale for this project is now in the region of eighteen months to three years, depending on speed of negotiations etc. As far as the agreed emptying of septic tanks, the proposal is that Thames Water will have an agreed supplier, and the residents will call the company, who will then invoice Thames Water once the tank has been emptied. All details should be with residents by 24th May. The Chair thanked them for coming and they left along with Jim Gillett at 8.36pm.

#### 59/19 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST AND ANY WRITTEN REQUESTS FOR PECUNIARY INTERESTS IN ITEMS ON THE AGENDA TO BE CONSIDERED BY THE CLERK – Cllr. Ryatt declared an interest in Planning Application No. 191000, but as this is an application for information only, she did not leave the room when this agenda item was reached

#### 60/19 Approval of the Minutes of 8th April 2019 – These were approved.

#### 61/19 <u>Highways</u>

The committee assessed the data from the machine and agreed that if a suitable site could be found to measure speeds in the other direction, then this should be done. It was noted that a further traffic survey was taken on Park lane last week to assess the need for a crossing by the school.

#### 62/19 Environment

Cllr. Anderson reported that as part of the tree survey, they had found the biggest one so far, on the edge of Charvil Meadows. She had attended the Veteran Tree Association's Annual meeting and the main issue was that of Ash die-back. The Association intends to contact local councils to work with them to deal with the issue of increasing numbers of dead and rotting trees. They will also be looking to work with Councils to advise on what trees to replace the dead ash with as many areas will be decimated.

### Items for Consideration

### 64/19 To Update the Objectives Paper

The Chair ran through this – it was recognised that with Cllr. Jeffery's absence, sites were not being routinely visited as before, and it was suggested that members of the committee took turns to do this, so that the workload is spread evenly. It was suggested that all the Council would be invited to walk the village footpaths in the summer – a provisional date was set for 22nd July at 7pm. The Chair had produced a short paper to share with residents at the Annual Parish Meeting as a basis for further discussion as part of the effort to improve communication with residents.

#### 65/19 <u>To hear feedback on the Community Involvement webinar attended by the Chair</u> <u>and the clerk</u> – this was useful and thought-provoking, with some useful ideas floated, but nothing ground-breaking

The Chair reported that she has been approached by someone acting on behalf of Scope wanting to put a recycling bin in the village. The clerk reported that the Borough had chosen to work with one provider of textile bins, because they were concerned that mush of what is collected is not recycled at all, and the clerk was concerned that such bins may attract vandals. The committee were keen to promote the recycling of clothes, and decided that it may be something that could be discussed at the Annual parish Meeting
