Neighbourhood Plan

We have made good progress in our working groups developing the five themes; Housing, Transport, Environment, Flooding and Community. We are now in the process of finding an experienced consultancy to help us put our ideas into the plans and policies for the Neighbourhood Plan. The analysis of the residents' surveys is still available at https://neighbourhoodplan.charvil.com. We will be consulting more widely when the draft documents are ready hopefully early in the new year.

Pavilion Redevelopment

The user focus group has been helping us with the plans for redevelopment, however, the escalating building costs have put any full redevelopment on hold .We will be moving forward with finalising and consulting on our plans. We are now looking at more cost-effective work to bring existing facilities up to a reasonable standard with the aim of doing a full redevelopment in the future. This is disappointing but the Council is aware that further significant increases in the precept to our residents won't be welcomed in the current economic situation.

Preschool

The pre-school provider has had to move their opening until September 2023 due to delays in scheduling an Ofsted visit, we are looking forward to supporting this facility for the village.

Queen's Memorial Oak & Community Orchard

Charvil has been very successful in planting trees and hedges for Queen's Green Canopy – thanks to the team of residents led by Councillor Mike Heath, it is great to see families getting involved in building a greener future for Charvil.

Thank you also to Teresa May MP for planting the memorial oak in the Hawthorns Park as a living memorial to our late Queen.

On 10th December, on a lovely cold sunny day, residents planted another 6 fruit trees in the Community Orchard, we are hoping to have some events there next year to celebrate establishing the orchard.

Village fete

Thank you to the Fete committee for organising another successful fete which was held in September. As well as providing a lovely day for the community they raised over £1000 for charity and are making further donations to the four charities nominated for the 2022 fete which were Berkshire, Buckinghamshire & Oxfordshire wildlife trust, The Cowshed, First Days Children's Charity, My Cancer My Choices. The date for 2023 will be announced soon.

Planning issues

The Council has been discussing options with Wokingham Borough Council on influencing, and reducing, retrospective planning applications, several of these have been brought to our notice by residents attending the open forum at council meetings. We will let you know if there is more we can do.

Pavement obstructions

Can I remind you that your hedges and bordering planting must leave the pavements clear of obstruction and allow free access for prams and wheelchairs etc.

If you are experiencing difficulty, it may be best in the first instance to ask if hedgerows can be cut back. 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Edited Extracts from the Minutes of Parish Council Meetings

Planning, Environment and Highways Committee 4th July 2022

To discuss how best to encourage more sponsors for fruit trees in the Community Orchard

It was agreed that something would be written in the Village News, put on the website and Noticeboards, linked on Facebook, and advertised at the Fete. It was suggested that people could sponsor a tree as a street, or with friends, not just as individuals. If enough sponsors are found, we may look at planting twelve this year.

To note the successful applications for more trees as part of the Queen's Green Canopy project

It was noted that Councillor Heath had been successful in his applications to the Woodland Trust for more trees to arrive this autumn, and that now there needs to be efforts made to get sponsors for fencing, compost etc.

To decide upon a date for the annual footpath walk

It was decided that this would take place on Monday 25th July at 7pm, beginning at the entrance to Milestone Avenue.

Amenities Meeting 11th July 2022

To note the refusal from Wokingham Borough Council regarding the application to fell the lone lime in poor condition that is located in close proximity to the school playground, pavilion and children's play park at East Park Farm and consider next steps.

The committee reviewed the refusal and conditions laid out by Wokingham Borough Council and have requested the Assistant Clerk to share the findings of the refusal with the tree surgeons who advised the tree needing to be felled and ask for a quotation for the suggested remedial works. Alongside this action, to respond to the refusal by Wokingham and ask them to put in writing that they deem the tree safe and not posing any risk to the public or property and that if the tree were to fall, they would be liable for any damage and costs.

Full Council Meeting held on 18th July 2022

To consider the consultations on the Local Cycle and Walking Infrastructure Plan and the amended route from Woodley to Palmer Park

It was agreed that the suggestions for Charvil should be broadly welcomed, but that some of the proposals were vague, and that there were also some

notable omissions, such as improving the facilities from Charvil to the Piggott School. The proposed cycle track from Charvil to Twyford Station is particularly welcome, but there are concerns there may be conflicts with dog walkers given the route of the proposed path goes through the Country Park. Give that the main area of concern for residents in the Neighbourhood Plan Survey was traffic and transport, it would be useful to speak to the team behind this at Wokingham, so that, as far as possible, our policies and plans align with theirs. The clerk has written to them to see if this conversation is possible but is awaiting a reply. As far as the Woodley plan is concerned, it is welcomed if it ties in with a safe route from Charvil to Woodley.

To hear an update on the Neighbourhood Plan Progress

Councillor Rob Jones updated the Council on the progress of the working groups – the flooding group is having a catch-up meeting before the Traffic and Transport group have their first meeting later in the week. The housing group is to meet on 3rd August. Councillor Rob Jones had attended a meeting on transport for new homes, which had been illuminating, and had provided him with ideas of what the Council should include. The final survey results should be out soon and hopefully these can be promoted at the fete. The steering group think that it might be a good idea to commission its own report on flooding, and there is also progress on trying to find suitable consultants to write our policies and plans.

To hear an update on the Pavilion Project

The Working group had met before the first meeting with the focus group. Three people attended and it was a very useful discussion – the wish list is long, and the cost is increasing under the current economic climate so there are funding issues, and the next step is to get some basic plans of the whole building to inform further discussions – if these come through in time, there will be more meetings on 29th July. There are also issues around the lease as all the personnel on both sides who had discussed this previously are no longer available. *Clerk's note: the plans were received just in time for these meetings.*

Finance and Planning Committee 8th August 2022

The clerk reported that it is likely to see the final three homes of a planning application from 1995 to complete The Hawthorns development next to the park start in the next few months. She explained that if a planning application is started, then any time limits are removed, and that you can apply for planning permission on other people's land, as was the case here – and now they have ownership, they can build. There is currently a nonmaterial amendment to the permission because the materials used in the late 1990s are no longer available.

Planning, Environment and Highways Committee 5th September 2022

To note that the next batch of fruit trees have been ordered and that some new sponsors have come forward

A mixture of pears and plum have been ordered and will arrive in November. So far, there are two confirmed sponsors.

To hear and update on the Queen's Green Canopy

Two residents have offered to contribute to the planting costs of the trees. Councillor Heath and the clerk met with Simon Bartlam, and a schedule of planting locations has been drawn up as a result, as most will be in the Country Park, although some will be planted to extend the hedgerow at St Patrick's Recreation Ground. It was noted that this was the hardest place to water. The planting will take place in National Tree Week.

To note that the annual footpath walk took place on Monday 25th July Several Councillors and some residents took part.

Full Council Meeting on 26th September 2022 Open Forum

Two residents attended, one to listen and one to make some observations on planning. The resident was concerned that a common condition of extensions in Wokingham is the need to try to match existing materials when building extensions, yet Application number 222391 at 2, Park Lane seeks retrospective permission for an extension that uses very different materials to the existing building. The extension being built at Iffliegh, Park Lane, is being built in contravention of the plans both in what is being built, and the materials being used. He is concerned that by allowing retrospective permission to regularise what has been built, rather than what should be built, it is setting a precedent for those that do what they like and then apply, as it is unlikely they will be made to amend what they have already built. Essentially, people are penalised when doing things correctly in his eyes. In addition, by applying for retrospective permission, it often means that there is no party wall agreement, as there should be on occasion. Party wall agreements are not part of the planning process but the same disregard is shown to these as to the planning process.

To approve the plan for the tree planting in November

The plan is to plant 165 trees and hedging plants in a variety of locations in the village, mainly in the Country Park, East Park Farm and St Patrick's Recreation Ground. Several volunteers are needed so there will be an advertising campaign on Facebook and Notice boards. This was approved.

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To note the broken windows at the Village Hall and the ensuing insurance claim, to note further acts of vandalism, and to consider whether the Council should pursue the idea of installing CCTV

The broken windows at the hall were noted, as was the sign at the Pavilion, the pulled-up tree at the hall, and the smashed bottles at the hall as well. It was agreed that the clerk would investigate dummy and real CCTV in other parishes, and that the details of the anti-social behaviour teams at Wokingham and Thames Valley Police would be shared to everyone. It was also requested that the vandalism at the hall is publicised on Facebook.

To hear an update on the Neighbourhood Plan Progress

The next meeting of the steering group is to be held on 30th September. The results of the survey are now on the Neighbourhood Plan website. The focus groups are moving along and are beginning to develop policies. Councillor Jones is now talking to consultants with a view to writing the plan.

To hear an update on the Pavilion Project and whether the Council should investigate the alternative proposal to renovate the existing building and ask the architect to quote for this piece of work

The last meeting of the working group was about the business case, which is the basis for a possible change of plan. After much discussion about progress, costs and possibilities, the idea of asking the architect to quote for conducting a survey of the building was approved. This would enable the Council to make a more informed decision on whether to do basic renovations, a complete renovation, a rebuild on the existing foundations (if that is possible), or to carry on with the original plan. It was recognised that in the current climate, the plan to build a much bigger building is unaffordable as interest rates are increasing rapidly, but that something must be done given the current state of the building. Once properly informed of the possibilities and related costs, the Council would then be able to discuss with residents what the possibilities are and take it from there.

To discuss how the Council might like to commemorate the life and death of Queen Elizabeth II

Councillor Jones wondered whether the Council could plant an oak tree, and possibly to include the School. A site needs to be identified and a plaque erected.

To note a thank you letter from the Fete Committee and to consider what steps need to be taken to avoid the difficulties of this year

The Thank you letter was noted, and the Parish Council are very grateful to the volunteers on this committee who ensure an enjoyable event takes place each year. The difficulties were acknowledged, and many of them stem from a lack of communication between the Fete Committee and the Parish Council. It was suggested that once a Committee had been formed for the fete next year, they attend an Amenities Committee meeting to talk through what the respective expectations are of the two groups, a mutually suitable date for the event, a timetable for paperwork to be received, and other issues that may arise out of such conversations.

Planning, Environment and Highways Committee 3rd October 2022 To note the latest information from the Speed Indicator Device

The Speed Indicator device is now measuring speeds as vehicles enter Charvil from the Twyford direction on the Old Bath Road. The speeds are clearly higher in this spot, making very hazardous for residents on this part of Old Bath Road.

The Borough Councillor has asked the Council whether they could investigate the costs of gateway signs as they have in Twyford and Hurst. There is evidence to suggest that they do slow traffic, and this could be useful of Old Bath Road, but there is a lack of suitable roadside on which to place such signs. The clerk was asked to explain this to the Borough Councillor, and if he can come up with some mutually acceptable locations, then the Council will consider investigating costs.

To note conclusions of a meeting with Simon Bartlam regarding the planting locations for ten elms near the stream in the Country Park

Councillor Heath and the clerk met with Simon Bartlam, who was happy for the trees to be planted on the south side of the stream, about six metres from the water, to allow flailing of the brambles every four years. They will be planted during half term.

Amenities Committee 10th October 2022

To hear a report from the Assistant Clerk regarding the recent ground clearance at East Park Farm.

The Assistant Clerk advised that the boundary areas either side and behind the pavilion had been cleared as instructed. There was more debris to clear than originally quoted for as there was a significant increase in green waste left on public land. In addition it has been noted that several houses are siting various bins on the land which need to be moved.

It was noted that back in Spring a letter was to be delivered to all houses that have a boundary with the field informing residents of boundary expectations but this was delayed when Wokingham Borough Council put TPO's (tree preservation orders) on all trees and hedging bordering the field. The Committee would like the letter updated and to also include the costs that have been incurred up to now relating to clearing the area.

To hear a report from the Assistant Clerk regarding the recent fly tipping and land issues at St. Patrick's Recreational Field

The Assistant Clerk advised that it had been reported that old fence panels had been left in the field and that several areas on the boundary of properties appear to have green waste dumped alongside. The Committee reviewed a quotation to have the areas cleared and approved the cost. It was proposed by the Committee that a letter be drafted (similar to that for East Park Farm) detailing the issues and delivered to all houses with a border to the field.

To consider locating a food donation box at the Village Hall for Woodley Food Bank

The Committee agreed to trial a box in the foyer when the hall is open. To be advertised accordingly in various forms – noticeboards, Facebook etc.

Full Council Meeting held on 17th October 2022

To consider whether the Council should pursue the idea of installing CCTV in the light of information from a neighbouring Council

After some discussion, it was decided to defer a decision on CCTV until January, or another bout of anti-social behaviour, whichever is the soonest, as it may be a short-term problem.

To consider the plan to encourage residents to volunteer to help with the tree planting

Various volunteers have come forward from those who helped last year, the Community Orchard group, and the tree wardens. A Facebook advertising campaign will start shortly, in the hope of getting a few more helpers. Councillor Heath will approach Theresa May, to see if she would come along to plant an oak in memory of the Queen, and Councillor Jones is to investigate the cost of a tree and of a wooden plaque. The clerk is to contact Wokingham to get permission to plant an oak in the park behind the Village Hall.

To approve a contribution toward the display boards in the Country Park

£1500 had already been approved for this project in a previous year, and the Women's Club have donated £344 to the Parish Council as a contribution, so it was resolved that the clerk would include a payment of £1844 in the payment run next month for this purpose.

In the light of the issues of fly-tipping and trespass, to reconsider a letter for residents backing onto East Park Farm fields and St Patrick's Recreation Ground

It was agreed that this should be done. The letter was approved subject to some minor amendments to be made by the clerk. It should be delivered by the Chairman as previously agreed.

To hear an update on the Neighbourhood Plan Progress

There is going to be a face-to-face meeting on 29th October and all the Parish Councillors are invited to attend. The aim is to pull together the themes, policies, and plans that the group think should be included in the Plan, and that would be the basis of what the group would ask a consultant to work on. Possibly the most contentious issue is around land allocation, and it is important that the wider Parish Council appreciates the issues, and how the group and Parish Council could be helped on this by consultants.

To consider pursuing the idea of a mobile Post Office

Councillor Sutlieff has been looking into this upon a request from a resident, and while the service does not have capacity at present, it was agreed this is something that should be pursued, and Councillor Sutlieff agreed to continue to champion this.



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To hear an update on the Pavilion Project, to note the quotes for two alternative courses of action from SWA Associates, the current cost projections from Sport England and the notes on a visit from the Wokingham Borough Council Energy manager

After a long discussion where various members raised concerns that we have spent a lot of money with no tangible outcome, it was agreed that the Council should opt for option A but that the clerk should clarify whether, if it transpires that rebuilding makes more sense once all the investigations have been done, the cost of option B would be much reduced as much of the work is the same as for option A. It was also agreed that the Council would like to keep the original plan in a dormant state, rather than disregarded altogether, as it may be that once the current world turbulence settles down, the plan can be re-visited.

To note that due to a backlog of work at OFSTED, the Pre-school is unlikely to be able to start before September

This was noted, and the clerk would remain in dialogue with Oliver Cloke.

Planning, Environment and Highways Committee 7th November 2022

To note the latest information from the Speed Indicator Device and to decide when to move it to gather data from the other side of the road

The data still suggested that over half of drivers are exceeding the speed limit, and 15% driving over 37mph.

It was agreed that the machine should be moved to measure speeds heading toward Twyford next time the batteries need changing.

It was also requested that in future, it should be moved close to the Wee Waif to remind drivers that they are now in a 30pmh zone.

To note the final plans for the tree planting, including the Jubilee Oak that will be planted by Theresa May

Councillor Heath explained that 165 trees were to be planted by his team of volunteers, including an oak in the Hawthorns park to commemorate the life of the Queen, and that planting will begin on 12th Nov in the Country Park, and will include the planting of the next phase of the Community Orchard and the Queen's oak, which will be planted by Theresa May. The planting will conclude with planting more hedging at St Patrick's Recreation Ground.

Full Council Meeting held on 21st November 2022 Open Forum

Two residents attended to discuss concerns about the current planning application at Iffleigh, Park Lane. Although this is not on the agenda as it will be on the Planning, Environment and Highways agenda for 28th November, the two residents still raised various points. The adjoining neighbour to this dwelling informed the Council that, because the cavity wall had not been sealed, and there was lots of food left lying around on the building site, there are now rats in the cavity. A pest control expert has been employed and hopefully the problem will be dealt with. The second resident is concerned that yet again, there is a retrospective planning application to regularise what has been built, rather than what had been approved to build, and this approach deeply concerns him as it is happening more and more frequently. He is also concerned that in this case, they are intimidating their elderly neighbours, which is immoral. He asked for the Parish Council to write to Sam Akhtar to see whether he could exert some influence on this and similar applications. At the end of the Open forum, one resident left and the other stayed for the rest of the meeting. Clerk's note: the clerk has written to Sam Akhtar, the deputy leader of the Council, and the lead for Planning at Wokingham on the subject of the cynical use of retrospective Planning Applications.

To note how the tree planting is progressing

So far, the tree planting has gone well, with many families getting involved. The final session will be on the weekend of 3rd/4th December, and the project is now being supported by WBC, in terms of helping with the costs and helping to ensure a good survival rate in years to come.

The Queen's Oak tree is to be planted on 26th November – the next stage of the Community Orchard was also due to be planted then, but due to the warm and wet weather, the trees were not dormant, and the ground was unsuitable to dig them up, so that has been put back to Saturday 10th December

The oak tree planting will be advertised on Facebook and on the Notice Boards.

To note the work of the Hardship Alliance and to consider what else the Parish can do to support this

Due to our buildings are unmanned, and there is no staff capacity to host warm spaces, this was not something that could be accommodated in Charvil, but it was felt that it would be useful if we could promote any warm spaces in Twyford. There is now a drop-off point for contributions to the Woodley Foodbank in the Village Hall. It was also agreed that an article would be included in the Village News to publicise any such spaces, and that people could

Planning Matters considered at recent Parish Council Meetings

The Council had no objection to the following applications:

- 222574 Application for the proposed erection of a single storey rear extension following demolition of the existing conservatory at 2, Balme Close
- 222674 Application for the proposed garage conversion to create habitable space at 2, Foxes Walk
- 223025 Householder application for the proposed single storey side extension, first floor rear extension following demolition of existing garage and store, and removal of existing rear dormer at 35, Park View Drive South
- 223133 Householder application for the proposed garage conversion and changes to the flank and rear elevation fenestration at 112, The Hawthorns
- Application for advertisement consent for 1 no. externally illuminated fascia sign, 8 no. non-illuminated window vinyls, 1 no. non-illuminated post-mounted sign, 1 no. non-illuminated panel ATM sign, 1no. non-illuminated poster frame and 4 no. non-illuminated lockable poster cases at 36, Park View Drive South

Council Comments on the following applications

- 222012 Application for the proposed conversion of loft to create habitable accommodation, including 1no. front dormer and 2 automated teller machine (Retrospective) at 36 no. rear dormers at 11, Old Bath Road the clerk was asked to comment as follows:
 - 1. It is unfortunate that the applicant failed to provide accurate plans and an accurate description of what they are proposing in this application. This has hindered the democratic process in that at least one of the neighbours did not feel in a position to comment directly on the application, and others may have taken the application at face value.
 - 2. This site has been the issue of multiple applications in the past three years, most of which have been refused for either being out of keeping, impacting on neighbours, or both. This application is similar in style to the dwelling at No.15, which is a step in the right direction, but fails to recognise that because nos. 9 and 11 are so close together, having a flat two storey wall will have a negative impact on the neighbouring dwelling due to the mass so close to their boundary.

3. Because the two homes are so close together, it would also detract from the street scene, which currently has an open aspect – this would be lost.

For these reasons, Charvil Parish Council believe that this application should be refused.

Outline application (all matters reserved except access to the site) for the development of up to 200 dwellings and associated infrastructure, open space, biodiversity enhancements, landscaping, and green infrastructure, following demolition of existing agricultural buildings (means of access into the site from New Bath Road to be considered) at Bridge Farm, Twyford

It was agreed that the Parish Council still stands by is original comments but was also asked to comment as follows:

Charvil Parish Council would like to add the following comments in relation to the additional evidence provided recently. The Council's original comments are still valid despite the extra information on travel - we still believe that this development will adversely affect the local road network by the addition of a very complex series of road changes on the A4, although the reduction in the speed limit between Charvil and Twyford is broadly welcomed. That said, this should be done as a matter of course, not just because of development. The flood risks to the South and West of the site are also not adequately addressed to ease the fears of Charvil residents

222391 Application for the proposed garage conversion, removal of hip roof to form gable roof and loft conversion with rear dormer (Retrospective) at 2 Park Lane – the clerk was asked to comment as follows:

Charvil Parish Council have no concerns about the extensions in themselves but are concerned that other properties in the area have all had the condition that the external materials match the existing building, and this was mentioned in the decision that this was not permitted development. The Parish Council believes that for the sake of consistency and the wider external appearance of the area, the applicant should be asked to ensure that the materials used match the existing.

Application for the proposed single storey side extension, single storey rear extension, conversion of loft to create habitable accommodation, to include 2no. front dormers, 1no. rear dormer plus changes to fenestration at 11, Old Bath Road - the clerk was asked to comment as follows:

Charvil Parish Council would like to comment on this application as follows:

- 1. This site has been the issue of multiple applications in the past three years, most of which have been refused for either being out of keeping, impacting on neighbours, or both. This application is similar in style to the dwelling at No.15, which is a step in the right direction, but fails to recognise that because nos. 9 and 11 are so close together, having a flat two storey wall will have a negative impact on the neighbouring dwelling due to the mass so close to their boundary.
- Because the two homes are so close together, it would also detract from the street scene, which currently has an open aspect – this would be lost.
- 3. The single storey side extension is also a concern, because although the plan suggests this will remain a garage, the plan description makes no mention of this, and given it is already half built, it appears this is intended to be habitable accommodation. This is misleading.

For these reasons, Charvil Parish Council believe that this application should be refused.

Application for the proposed conversion of a single dwelling house dividing the existing dwelling and garden to allow for two individual residential dwellings. To include rear paddock area one 3no. bedroom dwelling and one 2no.bedroom dwelling and the conversion of existing garage to habitable space at 6, Old Bath Road – the clerk was asked to comment as follows:

Charvil Parish Council does not object to the division of the house if this is acceptable to the planning authorities, but it does have serious concerns around the change of use of a large part of the garden to paddock. The area concerned is in the middle of private residences and has no means of access for livestock. It is an inappropriate location for a paddock, and changes of use from garden to other uses have been refused at other properties on the Old Bath Road. Allowing this would create a dangerous precedent for further changes of use to the back gardens on the Old Bath Road.

222704 Application for the proposed erection of a single storey rear flat roof extension and a single storey side/rear flat roof extension, following the demolition of the existing garage at 11, Old Bath Road - the clerk was asked to comment as follows:

The Parish Council would like to make the observation that the application form is misleading because, although there is existing planning permission for extensions, what has been built does not have permission, therefore this application is at least part retrospective. Accurate applications are necessary as part of a fair planning process.



Don't make it easy for burglars this winter and holiday season

As the winter nights close in, leave a light on... and burglars in the dark! Burglars are often opportunistic thieves and you can take steps to avoid becoming one of their victims this winter.

- Make your home look occupied by using timer switches on lights and radios, these can also help conserve energy and save money.
- Illuminate your front door with energy saving dusk to dawn lightbulbs that come on automatically.
- Consider purchasing and installing a video doorbell, house alarm or CCTV system.
- Close and double lock all doors and windows when going out those 10 or 15 minutes on the school run or popping out to the shops are all a burglar needs to break into your home.
- Always double lock doors and windows at night and when you go to bed.
- Keep all valuables and keys out of sight and away from doors, windows and letterboxes.
- When not in use, store electronic car key fobs in a signal blocking pouch to prevent them being scanned by thieves to open and steal your car.
- If you have a key safe, ensure it is not visible to people passing by, but anyone tampering with it can be seen.
- When working from home, ensure laptops and electronic equipment are not on view.

VILLAGE FACILITIES

Village Hall, The Hawthorns, Charvil



Since its opening in May 1988, the Village Hall has continued to serve the community and residents of Charvil and the surrounding areas as a superb venue for both social and recreational events, ranging from the many clubs who use the hall on a regular basis

through to administrative functions such as the Parish Council meetings and the Annual Parish Meeting.

The Village Hall is used regularly by over thirty clubs and groups. A current timetable of these clubs is shown in the centrefold of this magazine. Additionally, the building is used for private parties, weddings and other occasional social events.

If you are looking for a venue for a private social event, the light and spacious main hall provides an ideal location. For those smaller craft groups or meetings, the committee room is the perfect space for up to 15 people. Please contact bookings@charvil.com to enquire about availability or reservations.

Facilities

The hall is continually maintained and cleaned. It provides excellent facilities for groups ranging up to 200 in number (150 if closely seated). The building comprises:

Main hall (17m long by 9m wide). It is possible to accommodate a bouncy castle up to 14ft high. (22 large tables 182.5cm long by 76.5cm wide and 76cm high, plus 150 chairs)

Smaller room (6.3m long by 3.7m wide). Known as the committee room, suitable for smaller groups or meetings. (10 small tables 91cm long by 76cm wide and 70cm high, plus 15 chairs)

Fully fitted kitchen with cooker, fridge, microwave, hot water urn, kettles plus crockery and cutlery.

Additionally, there are WCs for both male and female, together with a dedicated disabled WC and baby changing.

Well-lit dedicated car park to the front of the building comprising 47 spaces plus 2 spaces for disabled.

Pavilion, East Park Farm, Charvil

Located on the playing fields at East Park Farm, adjacent to the Charvil Country Park. The Pavilion building is versatile and home to both sporting and community groups, as well as social gatherings especially for those requiring the use of the large sports fields surrounding the building.



The regular clubs who use the building can be found on the current timetable, but it is also available to hire for private functions or social events.

Facilities

The main hall is continually maintained and cleaned. The maximum capacity for the main hall is 100 people. The building comprises:

Main hall (12.4m long by 8.1m wide). (21 large tables 182.5cm long by 76.5cm wide and 76cm high) and 68 chairs.

Compact kitchen with fridge, microwave, kettle, plus crockery and cutlery.

Direct access to the building by car for the event organiser and disabled users (4 spaces directly outside)

Large car park alongside the tennis courts 40 plus spaces available.

Four team changing rooms with showers and one referee changing room with showers.

Additionally, there are WCs for both male and female, together with a dedicated disabled WC and baby changing.

Sports Facilities, East Park Farm

Alongside the Pavilion building there are two full size football pitches which are well used at the weekend and an artificial cricket strip, all of which available to hire.

The purchase of an annual membership from the Charvil Parish Council gives you access to the tennis courts all year round.

COMMUNITY ORCHARD PART 2

Last year, six kind sponsors came forward to pay for six apple trees to be planted in the park at The Hawthorns, and thanks to a group of volunteers – some sponsors and others who are keen for the project to work – the trees have been nurtured and are flourishing.

This year we took the advice of our tree supplier (an expert in community orchards), and he suggested we plant a mixture of plums and pears – so after an appeal for sponsors, to which we had a fantastic response – a further six we due to be planted at the end of November.

The trees must be dormant before being lifted from the ground, and as the autumn was so mild, we had to postpone the planting date until the trees were ready. We re-arranged the date for 10th December, but even then, it was touch and go, with the trees arriving late the day before!

Like last year, the planting took place in the coldest weather of the year, but the intrepid group of sponsors and volunteers worked hard to have them all planted successfully, and there was a real sense of achievement from the group.

We already have potential sponsors for a further six trees next year, but if we could find some more, then we might go for twelve - so if you are interested, please contact the clerk at clerk@charvil.com

Finally, if you visit the orchard, you will notice that there has been a lot of cutting back of brambles and scrub, and the building of a dead hedge. This is the work of Conserve Reading on Wednesdays, who have been working on a re-wilding project, both to improve biodiversity, and to remove invasive garden escapees. They are a group in high demand, and so the hope is to form our very own Charvil Conservation group, both to continue the work in this park, but also to work in other parts of the village as things develop. If this is something you are interested in, please get in contact with the clerk. This would be a group run by volunteers with background support of the Parish Council, not a Council run initiative.





THE QUEEN'S GREEN CANOPY

The Queen's Green Canopy is a nationwide tree planting initiative created to mark the Platinum Jubilee year and takes place between November 2021 and March 2023. In the first planting season of 2021/22, this living legacy saw over 1 million trees being planted across the UK and there are a lot more to come in 22/23!

All the trees are supplied by the Woodland Trust and are native to the UK, which means that they arrived to the UK over 10,000 years ago, as these are of greatest benefit to UK wildlife.

In Charvil, the Parish Council decided to run such one programme, to include volunteer residents from around the village, that has led to an amazing 220 trees being added to our green spaces. Together, we have created a new avenue of 25 small leaf lime trees, a scrubland habitat for wildlife, repaired a hedgerow and planted groups of rowans, crab apples and silver birches all of which will give a spectacular display and provide food and shelter for our native insects and birds in years to come. The four weekends in November of this year culminated with Theresa May helping us plant the 200th tree, a commemorative oak, in memory of the Queen at the Village Hall.

Volunteers across the parish included young families and it was particularly heart-warming to see the children enjoying digging holes and the excitement of planting. Maybe, as the trees grow to become the village's green future, so too they will grow to become the next generation of green guardians with positive appreciations of the environment.

This programme and others under the Queen's Green Canopy umbrella, such as the hedge repairing by the Girl Guiding group, have helped make Charvil a greener place to live in with the added benefit of community involvement in both the planting, care and watering.



CATERPILLAR CLUB

Caterpillar Club continues to thrive, with a committed team running the group and friendships and connections being made through the group. 
- 1. Turn appliances off at the plug socket (saves around £65 per year)



BERKSHIRE GUILD OF SPINNERS, WEAVERS AND DYERS



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
